County Seeks to Purchase Property as Home for New Senior Center

Submitted by Rensselaer County and the Village of Hoosick Falls Board of Trustees

Rensselaer County is seeking to purchase property on State Route 22 in Hoosick as the new home for the county senior center in the Hoosick area, County Executive Steve McLaughlin and members of the County Legislature recently announced.

The county is seeking approval by the County Legislature to allow for the purchase of the former Dollar Tree store located at 21299 State Route 22. The county has been seeking to find a new location for the senior center as the Murphy Building owned by the county has become outdated.

The county has already opened a new county senior center in downtown Troy, including expanded access and more modern services and features. The county center in Troy was opened in April in City Station on Sixth Avenue and replaces the former senior center on Third Street.

The cost for the purchase of the Dollar Tree is set at \$575,000. A resolution to approve the purchase has been submitted to the County Legislature and could be considered at the August legislative meeting.

Rensselaer County would also move a DMV satellite service and mental health counseling services to the new location.

The current senior center is located in the county-owned John A. Murphy Building on Church Street in the Village of Hoosick Falls. The building was renovated for county use approximately 50 years ago, but structural issues have emerged that make improvement and further renovation for county use challenging.

"Rensselaer County has been exploring opportunities to find a new home for our community's seniors, and this building seems like a very good fit. Having visited the current senior center many times, I know that it has outlived its usefulness. The Dollar Tree building is in a good location, and will house other important services for our residents, like the satellite DMV," said Legislator Bruce Patire.

"Senior services are very important in Hoosick and we welcome the news the county plans to establish a new and more modern senior center in town. This will benefit our quality of life and senior services in the area," said Town of Hoosick Supervisor Mark Surdam.

However, the Village of Hoosick Falls Board of Trustees has raised concerns in a letter signed by the entire board and sent to Rensselaer County officials with the purpose of expressing the "representative views and concerns of Village resi-

dents and leadership." It asks that "the Legislature not act on this plan at the August regular meeting, allowing for more thorough discussions and further planning to be completed regarding this potential move."

The county has stated it is committed to working with the Village of Hoosick Falls and the Town of Hoosick to find new uses for the property.



HACA Food Pantry Struggles to Meet Increased Demand

The Hoosick Area **Church Association** (HACA), 26 John St, served the local community through the pandemic, but the mission is even more challenging now as the organization faces a steep increase in demand for its food pantry and other services. This is attributed to the increases in need from inflation and supply chain issues hitting the economy at

the same time. Requests for help soared more than 50% in June compared to a year earlier. So far in 2023, HACA has served 41% more people than for the same period in 2022.

The nonprofit has spent 83% more so far this year in food purchased from the Regional Food Bank that was previously augmented by grants, donations, or commodities before and during the pandemic. This is an increase of over \$12,500 so far, with the Holiday Box program fast approaching.

It's natural that the first thing anyone thinks to donate to a food bank is food, but toiletries and hygiene products are also extremely important. Alongside the standard food parcel, the HACA Pantry provides other essential non-food items to adults and children in crisis, such as personal care, cleaning, and paper products.

Hot Weather Safety Tips for Families Facing Dementia

As temperatures rise, extreme heat can have a significant impact on everyone's safety, but can be especially stressful and confusing for individuals with Alzheimer's and other dementias. Alzheimer's disease causes a number of changes in the brain and body that may affect one's safety, including changes in sensitivity to temperatures.

Today, there are more than 6 million Americans living with Alzheimer's disease, including 410,000 in New York. Taking measures to plan ahead for weather changes, like extreme heat, can prevent injuries and help a person with dementia feel more relaxed and less overwhelmed.

"People living with Alzheimer's and other dementia can be vulnerable during extreme weather because their judgment may be impaired and they may be unable to communicate discomfort," said Elizabeth Smith-Boivin, executive director for the Alzheimer's Association Northeastern New York Chapter. "It's really important to take extra precautions with these individuals when there is extreme heat or other excessive weather conditions."

Having a plan for extreme weather can help a person with dementia feel more relaxed and less overwhelmed. The Alzheimer's Association offers the following tips for caregivers:

Stay informed - Turn on weather alerts on your mobile device and check local forecasts. Remember that humidity and air quality are also important to monitor during summer months, not

just temperature.

Know the signs of heat illness - The National Institutes of Health's Hot Weather Safety for Older Adults guide outlines types of heat illness, ranging from sunburn to heat stroke, and outlines signs of each. Dizziness, racing pulse, and confusion are some common signs that a person needs help. Also note that people taking diuretics, sedatives, or certain heart medication may not sweat much, but could still be overheating.

Stay hydrated - Ensure your loved one is drinking plenty of water, electrolyte beverages, or juice, and avoiding drinks with caffeine and alcohol. Dehydration may be difficult to notice in a person living with Alzheimer's, since they may not be able to share their symptoms. Your best option is to focus on good hydration throughout the day.

Stay indoors and out of the sun - Keep individuals cool by using air conditioning at home or going somewhere cool, such as a senior center or shopping mall. If you must go outside, be sure the person with Alzheimer's is wearing loose, light clothing, a hat, and sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher, and limit their time in the sun as much as possible.

Prepare for behavioral challenges - Research shows that heat can increase agitation and confusion in people with dementia. Try to remove behavioral triggers by addressing the person's physical needs related to the heat, then tending to their emotional needs.

Medicaid Telehealth Coverage Extended

The New York State Department of Health has announced that New York State Medicaid will continue to provide comprehensive coverage of telehealth through December 31st, 2024. Telehealth services, or the use of electronic information and communication technologies to deliver health care to patients at a distance, expanded dramatically during the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency (PHE).

In New York State, telehealth has become a widely accepted alternative to in-person care for Medicaid members. Medicaid requires providers to offer in-person care, with the option of adding telehealth to their practice if it is within the scope and appropriate for their services, so that patients can choose between the two modes of care.

Prior to the PHE, Medicaid covered some telehealth services, including audio-visual, store-andforward, and remote patient monitoring at certain facilities. During the PHE, this list was expanded to include over-the-phone care.

Following the PHE, Medicaid has added virtual patient education and virtual check-in and anticipates including eConsults in the future. Medicaid also expanded the eligible providers who can offer telehealth services.

When used appropriately, telehealth can improve consumer health, reduce provider costs, and make access to care more equitable, particularly for medically underserved communities. Last year, the state Medicaid program conducted a survey about telehealth preferences that found a vast majority of the New Yorkers had used telehealth during the past two years.

Helping Veterans and Low Income Families Access Healthy Foods

The New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets has announced several programs that are available to help low income families, veterans, service members, and older adults purchase fresh, healthy foods at local farmers' markets through the Department's Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (FMNP) and FreshConnect Checks Program. New York State has over 700 farmers' markets, farm stands, and mobile markets participating in the FMNP and FreshConnect Checks programs.

Consumers who are eligible are provided with coupons to use for fresh fruits and vegetables at participating farmers' markets, farm stands, and mobile markets in the state. The Life of George Holcomb

A Snowy Thanksgiving

Wednesday, November 22, 1854: A snow storm. John F. drove the cattle home from the Rodgers farm and Capt. Skinner came and skinned four hogs for us and paid three cts per pound for the skins, they came to three dollars and 30 cts. This evening John F. rode to Lebanon and could not market the hog I expected said Tanner to buy but he could not take the hog. Thursday: John F. went uptown with his two horse team and carried Palmer Barnes 90 feet ash plank, and at evening John F. carried a fat hog to Palmer Barnes and for the same said Barnes is to pay him the cash, six dol 50 cts per cwt weight, two hundred ninety seven pounds. Friday: Geo P. carried Doctor Bates 7 bushel turnips and the widow Torrey one. Yesterday Doctor Bates called to my house and got one bushel turnips and he credits two dollars on account. Monday: Today my women dressed thirty nine fowls for market. Tuesday: Today John F. went to Pittsfield with my horse and wagon and he sold the 39 fowl at nine cents per.

Wednesday: I tended to chores and helped some to bank the house. Today Patrick Rafferty worked for us, he banked house, chopped and shoveled the ditch round the cider house. John F. went to Hancock with turnips, he paid one bushel to Gustus Landon for me which squared my account with him for a wash stand and then John F. charged said Landon for 3 bushel, he then charged Bartlet for 5 bushel and Hecock for 6 bushels and sold 12 heads cabbage for 60 cts cash, and paid 80 cts cash to the Union store for two gallons molasses and forgot his jug to fetch the molasses home. Thursday: Today Geo P. and wife and her sister Ellen went to Lenox to hold Thanksgiving to his father in law's, Wm. McMurray. Saturday: This morning John Merrils helped John F. butcher two pigs and then he went with my horse and wagon to Hancock and carried one pig to Hecock and the other to Mr. Landon and turnips to Hecock, and John F. got the jug of molasses he forgot and left the jug the other day to the Union store. Sunday, Dec. 3: A snow storm and high wind drifted the roads and blew down a number of apple trees tonight. Tuesday: John F. went onto the highway to break out the road where it was drifted and John F. helped Geo P. butcher two pigs.
